- (1) There is established as a nonlapsing fund the Sterilization Fund ("Fund"), which shall be used solely for the purposes set forth in this subsection.
- (2) Deposits into the Fund shall include:

- (A) Two dollars from each fee paid for the application, issuance, or renewal of a dog license; __
- (B) Funds authorized by an act of Congress, a reprogramming, or an intra-District transfer to be deposited into the Fund;

- (C) Any other monies designated by law or regulation to be deposited into the Fund; __
- (D) Interest on money deposited in the Fund. __
